TA-DAH (MCA Universal) Scissor Sisters' sophomore outing reaffirms their unofficial tag as "jack of all trades" with danceable tracks clearly influenced by early McCartney pop, a glam Bowie vibe, ABBA harmonies, Pink Floyd psychedelia, Bee-Gees' disco, and even the Carpenters. Sir Elton John pounds the keys in "Don't Feel Like Dancin'," an oxymoron since it actually makes you want to take on the dance floor. Frenzied, elevated sonic fun.

RISE & SHINE (Random House, P799) Famous TV host Meghan Fitzmaurice self-destructs when she calls her guest a "fucking asshole" on air. A social pariah overnight, Meg runs to Jamaica to reflect on life while her only son nearly gets killed back home. Now, it's up to her social worker sis, Bridget, to bring Meg back to the real world and attempt to resolve a lifetime of sibling rivalry both never even knew they had, but Meg's calculating ambition threatens to drive away everyone she loves.
